

At the Stated Annual Meeting we paid tribute to Ross Mitchell who has stood down from being Treasurer after some 13 years service. We are grateful to Ross for all his hard work on our behalf. At the same meeting we formally welcomed Brian Honan as the new Treasurer and we wish him well in this post.

We have now adopted a new way of ordering the affairs of the church. We are operating under the Unitary Constitution, approved by both Presbytery and the General Assembly. This means that we no longer have a Congregational Board - all matters are in the hands of the Kirk Session. However, this does not mean that only elders can be involved - on the contrary, this way of working should involve more participation by all people in the congregation. It works on a system of small committees who then 'feed in' information and recommendations to the Kirk Session. The good news for those volunteering their talents to these committees is that you do not have to be involved in long meetings! The idea is to be flexible and use people with particular talents for specific jobs. We certainly hope this will encourage more people to become involved. So if you are approached to join a committee please say 'yes' We want all people in the congregation to give of their talents to help shape our church.

Perhaps one of the first opportunities for this will come in the summer weeks. We are planning a new kitchen for the Lower Hall (badly needed) and Gordon Simpson is looking for volunteers to help. Plans are ready, and with the help of willing volunteers, the kitchen can be installed during the quiet spell for hall usage. So if you think you can help please sign the list which is in the bottom corridor. There is a job for everyone from construction to painting to clearing up or making tea. Can you help?

As you can see there are busy times ahead of us. Let us thank God that we are active for his Name's sake





JUNIOR CHURCH



Junior Church finished the year well by sending off 256 shoe boxes. The response from the congregation was superb and the 3rd Barrhead Guides gave us a real boost by holding a "Body Shop" party with all the proceeds going towards the shoe box postage. We have already started collecting for this year and many of you have said that you prefer buying things over the months, rather than one big effort in November - we are happy to receive donations at any time. Special thanks must go to Nancy Downie, who covered over 100 shoe boxes with Christmas paper last year and has started on this year's already. Our Nativity Play was very well attended on Christmas Eve and the children, as always, gave star performances.

Africa Partnership Update

Over the past eight months the African Partnership Committee has been overwhelmed by the support and generosity received from members of our congregation. You raised £1000 as a retiring offering at the Harvest Service and another £1000 through the Church's Christmas card



scheme. This together with personal contributions and a £1500 donation from the

Barrhead Church means we are able to commit to sending nearly £9000 to help start projects in Kibera. The Church in Kibera is now meeting to decide the best use of this money and we hope to report back on their progress in the near future.

The Barrhead Church has adopted the Kibera Project as part of their ongoing mission work and we hope to encourage as many members as possible, from all the Churches, to help with the future development of the project in the coming years. If you are unaware of the reasons why we are undertaking this project, and would like details of how we can help the Church in Kibera, I have included below an extract from the leaflet distributed to the Barrhead Church congregations in late February.

To mark the first anniversary of our trip to Kenya we will be holding a social night in early June. This will be the first opportunity to view our DVD of the trip and everyone is welcome to attend. Also in early June we will be launching our website, which will be full of interesting facts about Kenya and the PCEA projects, along with photos and video clips of our trip. We will be announcing the web address in the near future.

Extract from the leaflet distributed to the Barrhead and Methodist Church congregations in late February:

African Partnership Committee Update

The Presbyterian Church of East Africa (PCEA) in Kibera currently serves a congregation of 600 adults, 80 youths, and also 150 children in its Sunday school. This congregation includes some of the neediest people living in the slums of Kibera. More than 80% of Church members are unemployed. Those who are employed earn between 1500 and 3000 Kenyan shillings a month. (£11- £22).

Due to these low-income levels the congregation has not been able to actively thrive, as they face a daily struggle to even feed their families. Most of the young people of the Church are affected by the lack of employment opportunities and many are out of work, making them a liability rather than an asset to their already poverty stricken families.

Although the Church in Kibera has many diverse needs and wants, they are spiritually rich, and if their needs were met it would be possible for them to achieve their vision of growth and development for their Church and community.

Currently the Church has no electricity, no water, and no toilet facilities. Without these basic facilities, the Church is unable to be used to its full potential.

In Kibera it is very unusual for anyone, or any organisation, to have the title deeds for a piece of land. However, the PCEA in Kibera has the advantage of owning the land on which the Church stands (around 1 acre), and would like to make full use of the ground it has available. Although at the moment it runs a school adjoined to the Church, this school is too small to meet the needs of the community. It currently has two classrooms, which can accommodate a total of 60 pupils, who must leave school after P2.

The Church is currently working on a long term development plan. Their main objectives are to;

- Build classrooms to expand the Primary School, allowing pupils to attend from P1 to P8, enabling them to complete certificated primary education.
- · Drill a borehole to obtain a clean supply of water for the Church, and the local community.
- · Construct a youth vocational training centre.
- · Install electricity to all its projects.

The PCEA is committed to ensuring that all of its projects are viable and sustainable, to improve the welfare of future generations.

The total cost of this project is around £50,000. This sounds a lot of money, and indeed it is. However, this is a long-term project. We have already received support from the congregations of the Barrhead Church, as well as the Methodist Church, and with your continued support we can help these people to fulfil their vision of growth and development, and improve their standard of living.


The club was once again delighted to lead the Congregation in our pre-watchnight singalong, which is becoming increasingly popular.



Finance Report - Easter 2007

The following is a report on the Church's Accounts presented at the Stated Annual Meeting on Sunday 11th March 2007, and should be read in conjunction with these Accounts. In line with the General Assembly's guidelines, a summary is included in the next page.

We started off 2006 by carrying forward a small surplus of £587 from 2005, meaning the General Fund at that time stood at £10,742. Fortunately during 2006 our income again exceeded our expenditure, this time by £917, meaning that on 31st December 2006 our General Fund stood at £11,659.



During 2006 total offerings rose by £1,583, with the total offerings received by WFO and Standing Order rising from £53,676 in 2005 to £54,725 in 2006, a rise of £1,049.

Whilst any rise is welcome, we cannot afford to be complacent as once again we were effectively reliant on 2 major sources of income to meet our commitments.

Firstly we recovered a significant sum from the Inland Revenue, £11,284 to be exact, via the Gift Aid scheme.

This figure could be significantly increased in future years if any members who currently pay income tax but do not currently make their offering by either WFO envelopes or standing Order were to now start doing so. On average in excess of £120 per week is currently received via the open plate money on which we are unable to claim back any tax from the Inland Revenue. For every £100 received under a Gift Aid declaration we can claim back £28.20 from the Inland Revenue.

The amount recovered emphasises the importance of the Gift Aid scheme to us, and I would urge anyone who currently has not completed a Gift Aid declaration to now consider doing so - it doesn't cost you anything and will take less than a minute to complete the form. Speak to John McGarrie, Ross Mitchell or myself if you have any questions or require a form for completion.

As a reminder the Gift Aid scheme allows the church to reclaim tax already paid by an individual so long as they have paid sufficient income tax in the financial year in question.

Secondly we received £5,812 in respect of hall lets, which is higher than the figure from 2005.

Between them these 2 sources of income account for over 20% of our total income; without either we would not meet our commitments.

During 2006 our expenditure actually reduced by £636 compared to 2005. This was mainly due to reductions in Fabric Repairs & Maintenance and reduced local costs.

Expenditure in 2007 is budgeted to increase to £84,757; an increase of £2,550 from 2006 as can be seen on the next page.

Whether we like it or not finance is an important element in the long-term survival of Bourock and is not something that can be ignored. If we wish to continue functioning as a church we must be able to support and fund our commitments to ensure our longer term.
