

Ordinary Days

Writer Anita Brechbill observed in *God's Revivalist* magazine that "Most often the Word of the Lord comes to a soul in the ordinary duties of life." She cites the examples of Zacharias performing his duties as a priest, and the shepherds watching their flocks. They were at work as usual with no idea that they were about to receive a message from God.

Luke describes the ordinary days when these men received their message from God: "While [Zacharias] was serving as priest before God in the order of his division, . . . an angel of the Lord appeared to him" (1:8,11). While the shepherds were "living out in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night . . . an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them" (2:8-9).

Oswald Chambers in *My Utmost for His Highest* said: "Jesus rarely comes where we expect Him; He appears where we least expect Him, and always in the most illogical situations. The only way a worker can keep true to God is by being ready for the Lord's surprise visits."




Bourock Soup Stop

We are delighted with the support we have had and are looking forward to our Christmas Lunch on Friday 18th December (bookings now being taken).





Finance Report - December 2008

In accordance with guidelines implemented by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland the following summary accounts, covering 2008, were presented to and approved by the Kirk Session on 22nd March 2009 and presented to the congregation on 29th March 2009 at the Stated Annual Meeting.

We started off 2008 by carrying forward a surplus of £503 from 2007, meaning the General Fund at that time stood at £12,162. Again during 2008 our income exceeded our expenditure, this time by £17,479. This meant that on 31st December 2008 our General Fund stood at £33,141.



During 2008 total offerings rose by £17,288 - the total offerings received by WFO and Standing Order rose from £60,241 in 2007 to £71,742 in 2008, an impressive rise of £11,501, which is most likely a reflection on the success of the Stewardship campaign.

Once again there were 2 other major sources of income - firstly, we recovered a significant sum from the HMRC, £18,353 via the Gift Aid scheme, again mirroring the rise in offerings through WFO and Standing Orders.

The amount recovered from HMRC again **emphasises the importance of the Gift Aid scheme**, and as usual I would urge anyone who has not completed a Gift Aid declaration to now consider doing so - it doesn't cost you anything and takes less than a minute to complete the form. Speak to John McGarrie, Robert McKenzie or myself if you have any questions or require a form for completion.

As a reminder the Gift Aid scheme allows the church to reclaim tax already paid by an individual so long as they have paid sufficient income tax in the financial year in question.

Secondly, we received £5,912 in respect of hall lets, which is slightly lower than the figure from 2007, but is still a significant portion of our overall income.

Between them these 2 sources of income again account for over 20% of our total income.

During 2008 our expenditure increased by £6,607 from 2007. This was mainly due to increased expenditure on heating & lighting in addition to a significant rise in spending on building repairs & maintenance.

Expenditure in 2009 is budgeted to increase to £105,659; an increase of £19,271 from 2008. The increase covers essential maintenance work on our properties as well as allowing for increases in heating & lighting costs.

Finally, a personal thanks to Brian Honan & all members of the Finance Committee for all their work and assistance during 2008.

Tribute To Nancy Downie

I know that Nancy's death came as a shock to most of us. We were all so accustomed to seeing her around the church, working, chatting and serving people that it seemed difficult to believe that she had gone from us.

A Glasgow girl, from the Parkhead area, Nancy came to Barrhead in 1961 with husband Tom. She always said that it wasn't really until after Tom's death that she became involved with Bourrock. She also said that she really got to know people first of all through a work party which was cleaning the church.

She was a choir member who had managed to serve in that group for more than 30 years.

And she was an elder, having been ordained in 1978. Nancy was a faithful visitor and often managed to brighten up the lives of those in her district with some home-baking! She also came along to Norwood every Sunday to help support the service there and talk to the residents.

And on the subject of baking, Nancy diligently and without fuss, raised thousands of pounds for church funds by selling her cakes etc at Saturday coffee mornings. Just as she diligently wrapped hundreds of shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child and repaired pew bibles.

She also faithfully looked after the flower bed at the front of the church. I do hope someone will take on this task as a fitting tribute to a hard working lady. I know many have plants in their gardens which were originally cuttings from Nancy's garden

As you probably know, Nancy also did much for the community through the Townswomen's Guild, the Community Council and the old peoples' welfare committee. she was also treasurer of Arthurlie Community Association.

We will miss Nancy - not just her personality but all of her contributions to our church life. but she will be missed most of all in her family - by daughter Janet and her husband, Bobby; by grandchildren Jill and David and her brother and sister. Our thoughts and prayers are with them as give thanks for Nancy's life.

The new session of Anchor Boys started on Wednesday September 2nd.

If this session is like previous ones, we will gain more boys as it progresses and need as much help as possible.



On our first night back, Ian Glover, the fire safety officer, paid a visit to explain to the boys about the new fire alarm system. We had a fire drill so that the boys could hear what the alarm sounds like. The boys responded very well, lined up and walked to the fire assembly point. We were very impressed by their behaviour and the speed with which they acted when they heard the alarm. Hopefully we will not need to do it for real!

Wednesday sessions are very busy. We have kept the programme much the same as in previous years with a mix of big games such as Hockey, Dodgey Ball, Port and Starboard, all of which the boys enjoy. We also have craft every night in the annex along with table games, play dough and target games.

The boys are willing and enthusiastic participants in all the activities.

The boys are grouped into teams which are made up of a mix of 1st, 2nd and 3rd year boys. Each night, they compete for points and each team aims to be the winning team at the end of the night. The boys in the winning team each get a sticker and competition is keen!

Upcoming events include the Hallowe'en party on October 28th; a visit to the BVC show in December and our Christmas party 16th December.

As always, I would like to thank the church session for their continued support and also our treasurer Derek Palmer.
