Dear Friends,

We all need to give some thought as to what we need to give up/take on board so that we are a lively and relevant worshipping community.

Let's start the process by coming together for our Advent services as we prepare for the joyful celebration of the coming of the Christ child. We need to let the world know that this is an occasion of great significance that we are celebrating.

May you all know the joy and peace of the Christ child.

## Disability Discrimination Act 1995

The above act was introduced as radical legislation which requires "service providers" (which includes Churches) in the making of services provided more readily accessible to disabled people. The definition used for a disabled person is someone who has a physical or mental impairment which has an effect which is substantial, adverse and long-term, on his or her ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities. Physical or mental impairment includes a sensory impairment e.g. blindness or deafness.

The requirements of the act will come into force in October 2004. In order to establish the alterations that will have to be made to the buildings of Bourock the Congregational Board has commissioned an Access Audit. It is expected that the completed report will be available towards the end of January 2002.

What has this to with the Congregation? The Board decided to establish a sub group of no more than four people to analyse, prioritise and plan the implementations of the report. If you have a special need in this area or an interest in the subject and would be prepared to help the sub group please pass your name to the Clerk to the Congregational Board, Bruce Brown. His phone number is listed at the front of the magazine.

December 8 Matinee of Sleeping Beauty - all looking forward to this.


December 10th Guide Christmas party and last night until January 7, 2002.



6. If they do something you think is wrong, let them know that it's their behaviour you dislike, not them.


7. Above all, pray for them. They may seem confident on the outside but feel weak on the inside. They need God to get them through these difficult years.


It was a great day and really testified to what church is all about. But apart from the fun it made me think of some real serious questions that we need to ask ourselves. Just how much do we care about Children in Bourock?

There is an ever increasing gap between what people say and what they do. Although we profess to care about children, we have to be honest about what the reality is. The hard truth is that there is still need for improvement. How do I know this? Because I heard what some of the children of our church had to say at the recent Children's Forum. The Forum discussed what the children liked and disliked about church, and about how they thought we should carry out mission. The evening was one of the best I have ever experienced in the church. There was honesty, care, love, and respect for all that was said, and there were many difficult subjects tackled. The children talked about how much they enjoyed worship, how much they liked the new songs we sing, and how the community of the church was a caring one. However they also mentioned that they felt shut out of communion, and that church could sometimes be too serious. Revelations for us all.

So how much do we care? Are we willing to be challenged on our traditions, to answer the call to live as a more inclusive community? I hope so.

With the Year of the Child almost upon us we are looking at ways to engage with all the youth organisations of Bourock. To do this we have asked all the organisations to send reps to a meeting on the 13th of December to examine where we are with youth work and what our vision for the future might be. 

# **Finance Report**


In my last report I stated that the work on the church roof was complete and I hoped to be able to give a summary of the costs in this issue of 'Steepletalk'. Unfortunately this will not be possible, as there are still some costs to be finalised before I can make this report. The Roof Fund currently stands at £62,831 and I anticipate that this, in conjunction with the grant aid of £38,500 will cover all budgeted expenses. However until all the bills are submitted and paid I cannot give a breakdown of the costs.



There has been a increase in requests for Standing Orders recently and I welcome this move towards an easier and more efficient way of giving. If anyone wishes a form or further information please contact myself, or any member of the Finance Committee.

## Anchor Boys

Anchor Boys resumed on Wednesday September 5th after the Summer break. We had 26 boys on the first night which was a busier start than we anticipated. Our numbers have now settled at 30 boys on the register and a weekly attendance of 26 - 30 boys.

As well as new boys, we have new members of staff:- Lindsay Simpson who has returned to the Boys' Brigade after an absence of some years, and Jean Hepburn who was a Girls' Brigade officer in the past. Three boys from the company section who are working for the Queen's Badge will be with us until Christmas:- Scott McDonald and Ross and Gordon Murray. We also have Gillian Webb from the Girl Guides who is working for her Baden Powell Award. The young people are a great help with the night's activities and we would find it hard to cope with the boys without their help.

We have a full programme each night and the boys heartily enjoy all the activities. The boys are divided into teams - Gorillas, crocodiles, Giraffes, Wolves and Foxes. Team points are awarded each night and are hotly contested

Each night we have a craft session which all the boys enjoy. So far this session the boys have made Harvest mobiles, Indian head dresses, pumpkins and spiders. They have also done dot to dot and colouring in. Look out for their work on the notice board in the annexe.

The primary 3 boys in their third year at Anchor Boys have started on the achievement programme. This consists of 10 achievements from 5 different categories - Spiritual, Physical, Community, Adventure and Interest. When all 10 achievements are completed, the boys are awarded a badge and certificate. The badge will be worn on their arm band once they move up to Junior Section.

On October 31st we had our Hallowe'en party. All the boys (and officers) came in wonderful fancy dress. We had pass the parcel, musical chairs, dooking for apples and lots of other games - and a good time was had by all. Our next big event will be a Christmas party with special guest!

In the new year we are hoping to get the boys involved in Battalion events for Anchor Boys. These events are non-competitive and are designed to present the boys with a challenge and also to allow them to meet and have fun with other Anchor Boys in the area.



You could attach a calendar to the bottom!



